




BECAUSE OF THE WORK WE DO, WE ARE:

- ✓ Combating "hidden hunger" in infants and young children
- ✓ Promoting breast and cervical cancer screening
- ✓ Protecting people from exposure to harmful chemicals in the environment
- Stopping Ebola in West Africa by understanding local funeral practices
- ✓ Reducing errors in medical testing
- ✓ Being able to talk with people about the ongoing change in their lives and how to better cope with risk and uncertainty
- Celebrating and preserving cultural heritage through museums and festivals, protecting historic properties for future generations by documenting their importance
- ✓ Working with the World Bank and UNESCO to make sure that development proposals include loan underwriting provisions that protect important heritage sites
- ✓ Providing expert testimony in asylum cases about conditions that make it unsafe to send someone back to a place where they face harm
- ✓ Documenting the impacts of displacement, the division of families, and deportations

- ✓ Helps to justify future research expenditures
- ✓ Assists in setting priorities for future research
- ✓ Guides the conduct of research to enhance its downstream impact
- ✓ Improves accountability to taxpayers, investors, and decision-makers
- ✓ Generates a higher public profile
- ✓ Complies with government requirements for performance measurement


BEYOND BIBLIOMETRICS

RESEARCH QUALITY AND POLICY IMPACT






