PROGRAMME FORMAT

The three-day programme (detailed in the following pages) includes several types of sessions as well as three “tracks” running through the days to help you choose the relevant elements for your work and get the most out of the conference. To help you decide, we describe the types of formats and tracks below:

Roundtable sessions	At the beginning of the session, the roundtable coordinators will introduce the topic and the discussion points, after which the whole group participates in the hour long conversation, sharing insights and experiences.	Pre-registration required, maximum 20 attendees
Workshops	The workshops offer a more practical experience to specific skills in order to improve and/demonstrate impact. The trainers offer a taste of possible hands-on learnings and potential follow up after the conference.	Pre-registration required, maximum 25 attendees
Other parallel sessions	Most other parallel sessions will include several presentations from different perspectives, followed by a panel discussion and Q&A. Plenary sessions	The plenary sessions are all different from each other in topics and/or formats, but all of them allow for input and questions from the audience. Engagement and Communication

This track denotes the importance of engaging with diverse societal stakeholders to amplify the impact of SSHA research. Sessions will highlight how building effective communication strategies with various audiences, including the public and policymakers, can enhance the credibility, quality and accessibility of research. Additionally, the track will explore how to foster trust and build meaningful connections that ensure SSHA contributions are both recognised and utilized in addressing pressing global challenges.



Policy, Funding and Recognition

Focused on the critical elements of science policy-making, funding frameworks that increase awareness and successful impact, and building in rewards and recognition to incentivise for impact, this track will delve into the strategies necessary to elevate SSHA research. Discussions will centre around the development of impact assessment, the role of government and private sector partnerships, and the importance of advocating for SSHA disciplines in policy agendas.



Infrastructures, Facilities and Tools

This track focuses on the critical role of infrastructure, cutting-edge facilities, and advanced tools in driving impactful SSHA research. It will emphasize how robust infrastructure and interdisciplinary collaboration environments can significantly enhance research outcomes. Sessions will also cover the development of tools that support knowledge co-creation and ensure SSHA research is well demonstrated to address complex societal issues effectively.

Not all sessions belong to one of these three tracks as there are many other topics being covered during the conference. You can also choose to follow the whole track, part of them, or none of them — it is up to you!

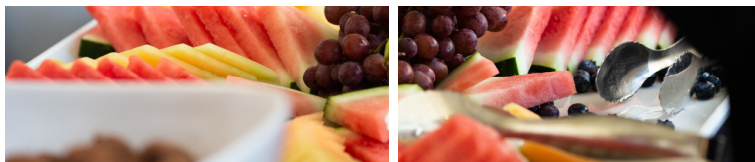
